"The nations raged, but your wrath has come, ... to destroy those who destroy the earth." (Rev 11:18: NAB)

his verse from the Book of Revelation warns of God's judgment on "those who destroy the earth." In the context of the plastic pollution crisis, it serves as a

frightening indictment of human activities that are damaging and defiling God's creation through environmental destruction. No one of God's creations destroys another. Sadly, the same is not true about humanity's creations.

In the context of this year's earth day, one of such activities is the irresponsible use of one of human own creations: plastics. The uncontrolled proliferation of plastic products and, particularly, plastic waste, contaminates lands, oceans, and ecosystems around the world. This could be viewed as humanity "destroying the earth" by saturating it with non-biodegradable pollutants.


This biblical passage suggests there are consequences from God for such wanton devastation of the natural environment. It frames plastic pollution as not just an environmental crisis, but a spiritual offense against the Creator by destroying and defiling the planet entrusted to humanity's care. It is a call to spur faith communities to corrective action to combat plastic waste.

Reject fast fashion: The fast fashion fuels overconsumption, disposable and environmental harm, hence, purchase affordable and sustainable clothing.

Protect the endangered species: Every animal, bird, planet, etc. is God's creation, they sustain the earth. Be watchful and protect endangered species.

March or Rally: Organize in your locality a march or rally to highlight Earth Day and its significance.

Activities and events: Have some activities in every parish/institution or events to mark this day. so that the parishioners or the students will remember this day and its implications.



Support plastics treaty: Reduce the usage of plastics in everyday life, and let our home and life become plastic free. Support the global plastics treaty.

Plantation: Plant a tree or grow flower garden or make your environment green. Let every house make simple plan for plantation.

Reduce, reuse, and recycle in the Garden: Reduce the plastic pots, reuse the waste, recycle the compost, find ways how your garden be green and free of plastics and waste.
